


Toledo, Spain

Toledo itself was amazing to look at in terms of landscape and architecture. I enjoyed to take in Spanish culture with not having to worry about classes right away.







Lisbon, Portugal


Lisbon had to be one of the most breath taking cites I have ever been to. We explored so many places that culturally emerged us into the Portuguese culture.

This was when we explored the city center of Portugal and got to get a lot of shopping in for our free beach day we had the next day.






Cuidad Real, Spain







Valencia/ Villa real

Not to mention that for such an affordable price we got such a great view of the game.


Santiago De Compostela, Spain

We took a guided tour and got to stop at a beautiful waterfall. I have learned to appreciate natures beauty from my trip to Spain.






My favorite moments came from the natural landmarks that we were able to admire about Spain.






These two Spanish students in our engineering class made great suggestions on places to go and turned out to be great friends.










The boat was fun and so relaxing that it put some of us right to sleep.




Going to the Alhambra had be speechless. The Islamic influence on the architecture was something I had never seen in my life. I was amazed at how so much beauty could exist in one place.
