The Main Square was beautiful; we saw the Convento de Santo Domingo, Municipal Palace of Lima, and the Cathedral of Lima.
























Ceviche Class, Dance Class, Inka Market!

historic Civil Engineering landmark). The alpaca steak we got for dinner came on lava stones and was so good!






























Goodbye Cusco, Hello again Lima!
