My Expectations


When coming to Peru, there were a few expectations for what I would see and experience...

He taught us how to make the dish and the importance of balancing the ingredients and flavors on the tongue.




Traditional Peruvian Dances

Cusco Experience












Exploring Lima




Central Restaurante
